While others believe the Easter Bunny originated from Germany. German children believed in "Osterhase" or "Oschter Haws."


It is said they colored nests for the bunny to lay the eggs. This tradition is thought to have come to the U.S. with German immigrants in the 1700s.

Easter Eggs

Traditionally, Easter eggs are painted chicken's eggs. This practice of painting eggs is thought to have originated in Mesopotamia, where eggs were stained red in memory of the blood of Jesus. Eggs also symbolize the empty tomb from which Jesus emerged when He came back to life.

Easter eggs today are often made of delicious chocolate and filled with toys and candy!
