

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



- ✓ A capital letter is used at the beginning of the spoken words.

- ✓ Start a new line for every change of speaker

Improving Diary Entries

Choose interesting vocabulary

You can change boring words like 'said' or 'went' for more exciting synonyms. A synonym is a word or phrase that means the same or nearly the same as another word.

Add adverbs to modify adjectives, verbs or other adverbs

Add further information about how, when where, why, how often or how much something happened with an adverb.

Opinions and feelings are important features of a diary entry. You need to add information about how the character was feeling at different points, and what he or she thought about what had happened that day.


Use different sentence starters

Find different ways to start sentences makes a diary entry more interesting to read. Try starting a sentence in some of these ways:

With an adverb	Cautiously, he peeped out of the nest hole.
With an '-ing' verb	Feeling brave, Plop decided to go exploring with the cat.
With an '-ed' verb	Stunned, the old lady stared at Plop in amazement.
With a simile	Like a roly-poly pudding, Plop landed at the boy scout's feet.
Where?	Behind the lady's legs, Plop hid from the scary rustling sound.

Use exclamations

Exclamations (or interjections) can help add colour to a diary entry and help express strong emotions. They are usually used in speech and in informal writing. Exclamations are usually punctuated with an exclamation mark.
