Answers

The answers are attached to the document but try not to peep until you have completed the task.

This week we would like to see how creative and imaginative you are.

Our topic this week is poetry and we thought it would be nice at the end of the week for you to write your own poem with the theme of 'Key workers' or 'Helping others.'

Look at the 2 poems attached to the planning sheet: The Tyger and Wind on The Hill. Look at the poems in turn and try to identify any rhyming patterns. Eg, can you spot the rhyming couplets?

What about the number of syllables on each line?

Look at the language which has been used- what do you notice?

Are each of the verses the same or are they different?

Can you identify any repeating lines, words or phrases?

You can make notes on each of the poems to help you. This could also be useful when planning and writing your own poem.

Main Task

Think about the themes of 'Key Workers' and 'Helping others' and decide which theme you would like to use for your poem.

Use a piece of paper and record all of your ideas associated with this theme. These might be words, phrases or even simple sentences.

The ideas you record will be used to help write your poem tomorrow.

If you wish, you can base the structure of your poem on one of the examples you were given. You could refer to these when recording your ideas.

Eg – working together, thankful, supporting others, caring, team work. Think about the rhyming pattern in your poem. Look at the notes you made on Tuesday when looking at each of the poems.

Task

Your task today is to write a poem on your chosen theme – Key Workers or Helping others.
