Once you have watched the video clip, you might want to watch it for a second time. Sometimes we notice different things after watching something a second time.

With an adult, think about the opening scene, Discuss the setting and the title and make predictions about the content.

Pause the film after the lighthousekeeper slams the window shut - What does he think about the people outside of the window having fun?

Why do you think the author put this scene into the film? (To make you think the villagers are up to no good/untrustworthy)

How does the creator build up the tension in the film?

Pause the video again when the lighthouse keeper breaks the lamp - discuss possible outcomes.

You will need to write your questions followed by the response that you think you will get from the lighthouse keeper. It is almost like the hot seating activities that we do at school.

Think carefully about the events in the film clip and what happened. You might ask about the reasons for closing the window.

Remember, interviews include closed and open questions. Closed questions are when the responses that you get are limited eg, how old are you? What did you eat for tea?

Open questions are when you ask a question and your responses might vary. Eg, What did you think of the people making the noise outside? How do you feel about....etc

Whichever task you decide to complete, your work from the lesson yesterday will be really useful.


